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Gospel Reflection Corner

grew up in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The winter in that city is very mild. It gets cold and rains, but you have plenty of sunny days and no snow.

When I moved to Metro Detroit, MI, in 2002, I found a completely different reality. The first time I saw snow, it was very magical and fun. Also, I enjoyed having a Christmas when it was cold and not with 100 degrees of heat and 90% humidity like in my home city.

However, the magic of the snow disappeared after a little while, and I started to miss the light. I remember doing a little research on the Internet and being surprised to find that in the Detroit area, the average number of sunny days in December is one, and in January, it is 100% more, two. So, in 60 days, you only have three full sunny days.

At first, it seemed strange that one of my history teachers at St. Heart Major Seminary in Detroit took a whole week off in February to go to the Caribbean. He would return each time with a great tan. But when Spring came, I understood. Even though I was seemingly all right, I realized I had missed the sun a ton!

St. John the Baptist came to give testimony to the Light, our Lord Jesus Christ. Advent is a season of preparing to receive the Light. It is like the end of winter, around the beginning of March, when you are waiting for the Springs.

In early March, the days get longer little by little, some trees start to get a few leaves, you can hear the birds sing, and many animals have new offspring. That already cheers one up. As we get closer to Christmas, we also get more and more glad. The joy increases day by day. The Light is almost here.

A few months ago, my mom, who is 75 years

old, had cataract surgery in one of her eyes. She decided to get this procedure done because her sight was not good enough to drive, and they would not renew her driver's license. She also could not distinguish people's faces on TV and told me she used the TV as a radio.

My brother-in-law, who is a great eye doctor, performed the surgery. That same day, my mom could read tiny letters on the TV without the aid of glasses. That was amazing. She was so happy; she was bragging about having perfect vision.

In the cataract condition, the lens of your eye gets cloudy, and you cannot see correctly. Vision becomes blurry, hazy, or less colorful. So, in the cataract surgery, they replace that lens with a new one.

We can also get cataracts of the soul. The eyes of the soul get cloudy through attachments to money, success, and popularity. Any sin, vice, or addiction that reduces our freedom also clouds the eyes of the soul.

To receive Christ, our Light, we need to have the eyes of the soul crystal clear. St. John the Baptist invites us to purification. The purest our soul is, the more we can see the Light of Christ's love, peace, and joy.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is the most potent healing procedure for the soul. Let's take advantage of it this Advent season. A good Confession is the absolute best way of getting ready to receive the Light.

I also suggest you spend time in prayer with the Blessed Mother this last week of Advent. Reflect on the great love with which Mary expects Jesus, the great joy of her heart as the big day approaches. Accompany Mary in her joyful expectation of the Messiah.


