Dear brothers and sisters,

This Tuesday I almost had a heart attack! We had adoration with the FOCUS missionaries before noon Mass. After benediction, I reposed the blessed Sacrament and went to the Sacristy to prepare for Mass. One of the altar servers told me that we should probably consecrate some extra hosts since there were more people than usual. Indeed, I had seen a few extra people when doing Benediction, so we did set more hosts out for consecration. I thought we would have ten more people or so and I was not prepared for what happened next. When I got to the altar, I lifted up my eyes and I saw 55 people in daily Mass. And most of them under 25 years old! Very impressive!

What happened is that the missionaries of Christ in the City decided to join us for Mass. It was such a joy to have them come and share in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. The singing of the Alleluia, Sanctus, Agnus Dei and Salve Regina was beautiful. But my favorite moment was the line for Holy Communion. It was a joy to see these young people receive our Lord with such devotion, reverence and joy. I was delighted when I heard that they will be visiting us every Tuesday!

Besides this unusual instance, attendance to weekly Mass and confessions has been steadily increasing. We've made a great recovery from the few people that would come last year. Of course, we now count on our 12 missionaries at the daily Mass. But, besides that, we have been seeing several new students, people that work in the area and occasional tourists joining us.

Speaking about our FOCUS missionaries, this week I joined them on Monday at the quad for volleyball, football, and other sports. There were more than 20 students that participated. I was very inspired and hopeful with such a response. Next week the missionaries will be starting three bible studies on campus. I ask you to please pray to our Lady of Guadalupe for the spiritual fruit of these efforts. Prayer is very powerful!

Gospel Reflection Corner

This Sunday we read Lk 16:1-13. The parable of the dishonest steward is the logical continuation of the three parables of mercy. According to St. Bede, after the Lord has talked about mercy, now he wants to teach us about almsgiving.

St. Mother Teresa told a powerful story of almsgiving in a conference she gave: “I never forget a little child who taught me a very beautiful lesson. They heard in Calcutta, the children, that Mother Teresa has no sugar for her children; and this little one, Hindu boy four years old, he went home and he told his parents: ‘I will not eat sugar for three days; I will give my sugar to Mother Teresa.’ How much a little child can give. After three days they brought into our house, and there was this little one who could scarcely pronounce my name. He loved with great love; he loved until it hurt. And this is what I bring before you – to love one another until it hurts. But don’t forget that there are many children, many children, many men and women who haven’t got what you have. And remember to love them until it hurts... I can enjoy this, but I give up; I could eat that sugar, but I give that sugar... you would be surprised of the beautiful things that people do to share the joy of giving.”

Jesus says, “I tell you, make friends for yourselves with dishonest wealth, so that when it fails, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings” (Lk 16:9). According to St. Augustine “dishonest wealth are all the riches of the world, whenever they come. For if you seek the true riches, there are some [spiritual riches] in which Job when naked abounded, when he had his heart full towards God. The others are called dishonest riches; because they are not true riches, for they are full of poverty, and ever liable to chances. For if they were true riches, they would give you security.”

To “make friends with dishonest wealth” is to use material riches to give glory to God, especially by almsgiving. The boy from Mother Teresa’s story understood how to use material things to love others. He gave with generosity until it hurt and found great joy in giving.

By giving generously, we use material riches for their true purpose, to give glory to God. Indeed, material riches are not an end in themselves but a means to get to heaven. By giving we also acknowledge that material riches are not true riches, but only spiritual riches are. Almsgiving is also an act of hope in God, because although material riches “promise” security, only spiritual riches can give us the security of eternal life.

Finally, let’s remember the saying of Jesus: “It is more blessed to give than to receive.” We will get more blessings, have more joy, experience greater happiness, from giving than from receiving. The gift of self is actually the secret of happiness that the Lord taught us in his greatest teaching moment, from the Cross.

St. Bonaventure, in his “Life of St. Francis of Assisi” tells us that once he “met a certain leper [on the road], and this unforeseen meeting filled him with loathing. (...) [Overcoming his disgust] he leapt from his horse and ran to embrace him. When the leper stretched forth his hand as though to receive an alms, he kissed it, and then put money therein. Then immediately mounting his horse, he looked round him on all sides, and the plain was spread before him unbroken, and no trace of that leper might he see. Then; filled with wonder and joy, he began devoutly to chant praises unto the Lord, purposing from this to rise ever unto greater heights.” Francis realized that it was Jesus whom he had kissed. He found tremendous joy and blessing from his almsgiving. Let’s go and do likewise.
