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# Gospel Reflection Corner

n ancient times, a preparation process was involved when a king or a dignitary planned to visit a town or city. The roads leading to the city would be improved. They would be cleared of obstacles such as rocks, fallen trees, or debris. Any damage to the road, such as potholes or erosion, would be repaired to provide a stable and comfortable surface for the king's entourage.

Valleys or low-lying areas along the route might be filled in to create a more level pathway. This leveling process aimed to make the journey as smooth as possible. In some cases, hills and inclines along the road might be flattened or partially excavated to make the ascent and descent easier for the king and the procession. All this effort was made as a gesture of honor and respect for the visiting dignitary.

This Sunday, the Church presents St. John the Baptist as a model for Advent. "A voice of one crying out in the desert: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths.'" St. Mark is here quoting from Is 40:3. That is our first reading for today.

Isiah further explains, "Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill shall be made low; the rugged land shall be made a plain, the rough country, a broad valley (Is 40:4-5)."

A few days ago, I found the following petition in the liturgy of the hours: "Bring low the mountains of our pride, and fill up the valleys of our weakness." I think this is an excellent explanation of what making mountains low and filling up valleys mean.

We aim to "clear the path" for our King. In this path, we find two significant obstacles, among others: pride and weakness.

To bring low the mountain of our pride, St. John the Baptist invites us to humility. "One mighti-

er than I is coming after me. I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals."

In other words, the Second Person of the Trinity takes on a complete human nature in the Incarnation, and that Person manifests himself in poverty and humility in his Nativity. Therefore, to approach this mystery, we must grow near it with a deep sense of awe. The Son of God becomes the son of Mary. God, who is infinite, takes on a finite humanity.

To fill in the valleys of our weakness symbolizes our low points, vulnerabilities, and shortcomings. These may include areas of moral weakness, personal struggles, or places we may be prone to failure.

We want to open up these areas of weakness to the mercy of the Lord. First, by asking for forgiveness for sins and experiencing freedom in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. And second, by trusting in the infinite mercy of the Lord, throwing ourselves in the loving arms of our Father.

Humility and trust is a shortcut to holiness. In St. Therese's words, "We are living now in an age of inventions, and we no longer have to take the trouble of climbing stairs, for, in the homes of the rich, an elevator has replaced these very successfully. I wanted to find an elevator which would raise me to Jesus, for I am too small to climb the rough stairway of perfection. I searched, then, in the Scriptures for some sign of this elevator, the object of my desires, and I read these words coming from the mouth of Eternal Wisdom: 'Whoever is a little one, let him come to me.' And so I succeeded."

Let's work on being little this Advent so that the Lord will find our hearts ready to welcome him. Then, he will do great things in us.
