

Gospel Reflection Corner

S acred Scripture uses the term 'holy,' 'kadosh' in Hebrew, to manifest God's trascendance from the world and natural forces. Our Christian liturgy, takes up the words written by the prophet Isaiah: "Holy, Holy, Holy!", "Other, Other, Other!" God is not any natural phenomenon, he is not the whole of the universe that we see, he is not any idol made by the hands of man, he is neither wealth, nor power, nor sex that pagans worship, but he is something that is 'beyond' everything earthly.

That holiness, that separation, that abyss of being that exists between the world and God is only a 'starting point.' God wants to bridge that distance. God does not create the world and man to leave them enclosed in their limits, in finite space and time, but to, from there, make man reach the 'Holiness' of God.

And how does the 'totally other and separate' approach the human being? How does the hidden reveal itself, the unfathomable begin to be comprehensible, the infinite manifest itself in the limited? The Hebrews, in Scripture, answer: by a kind of irradiation, of iridescence, of magnetism, of radioactivity, of 'radiance' that this Other brings to the human being and gradually reveals his 'kadosh,' his 'holiness,' his 'otherness'.

The Hebrews called this manifesting radiance 'kabod,' which is the Hebrew word that we translate imprecisely as "glory".

When we say then: 'the world has been made for the glory of God', what we mean is not 'for the applause of God,' but 'so that through the world, man may recognize and enjoy as it were the splendor of God'.

God who, little by little, wants to make himself known to man, so that man, one day, may come to enjoy his own holiness. That is to say, the 'Glory of God' is what makes the totally Other, the Holy, manifest, reveal itself, open itself to the human being. Hence, for the Hebrews, not only 'creation' is for the glory of God, but, above all, 'God's saving interventions' in favor of his people.

Isaiah and Ezekiel were already expecting a definitive manifestation of the kabod, of the glory, which will allow Israel to finally take refuge in divine holiness.

And that is the context in which we must understand our Gospel today, when the verb 'to glorify' is used. For Jesus Christ is precisely 'the supreme manifestation of God to man,' he is the final message, he is the plenary revelation, as we can now understand it. 'The hour is coming' when the power and holiness of God, which have been manifested in Jesus Christ, will be fully revealed in the Cross and Resurrection, "I have glorified it and will glorify it again". "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified," "Father glorify your name..."

It is not at all, then, that the Father or Jesus are going to be praised or applauded, but the time is coming when, finally, God is going to open Himself totally to man. God is going to offer his being, his 'holiness', beyond the limits of the universe and the human, to man.

The supreme hour of Easter opens our gaze to the unfathomable, hidden divine being, and shows us that his very essence is surrender, love, self-giving. That is why his holiness is glory for man.

To learn to discover his glory precisely when in death and suffering the idols of this world fall and the universe of mankind shows its precariousness and its destiny of nothingness, is to open oneself to the sanctifying action of God, is to learn to discover the meaning of Easter, is to be ready to surrender the life of this world in the service of Christ, to keep it in eternity, when we will be in the fullness of glory.
